Webpages are documents commonly written in HTML that are accessible through the internet or other networks using an internet browse.

Webpages are accessed by entering a URL address and may contain text, graphic and hyperlinks to other webpages and files.

URL- Uniform Resource Locator, termed a web address, refers to a web source that specifies its location on a computer network.

Have you heard of encryption? Why is it so important? Encryption allows information to be hidden so that it cannot be read without special knowledge (such as a password). This is done with a secret code or cypher. The hidden information is said to be encrypted. Decryption is a way to change encrypted information back into plain text.

Cryptography is derived from the Greek word 'kryptos' which means hidden or secret.

Cryptography is the art of protecting information by transforming it (encrypting it) into an unreadable format, called cipher text.

#### What is a computer network?

What is a computer network? Well it's simply a number of computers (or computer like devices) connected together in some way. The point of a network is so devices can talk to each other, this means that they can send and receive information.



#### **Important Words:**

**Abstraction:** Taking the detail out of a 'problem' to make it easier to solve.

Algorithm: Steps or instructions to follow to achieve a task

**Application (App):** A program such as a game or drawing app that performs a task on a computer.

Bugs: Mistakes or errors in code.

**Code/Coding:** Lines or blocks of instructions (see program).

**Computer networks:** Connected devices that make it possible to transfer data using an agreed method ('protocol').

**Command:** A step or line of programming (instruction for younger children).

**Conditional:** Something that is either true or false

**Data:** Numbers and information that can be represented by images, video, text and sound.

**Debug:** Finding and correcting errors (bugs).

**Decomposition:** Splitting things into smaller parts.

**Event:** Code that runs when something happens, such as a button being clicked.

**Execute:** Play or run code in a program.

**Input:** A method of computers receiving data (Eg. keyboard, mouse, touch, sensors etc).

**Logical Reasoning:** A systematic approach to solving problems.

**Object:** An item on screen, such as an image, a button or some text.

**Output:** The information produced by a computer system for its user, typically on a screen, through speakers or on a printer, but possibly though the control of motors in physical systems.

**Prediction:** Make a guess about what happen in a program or how a problem might be solved. Also know as logical reasoning.

**Program:** A series of instructions written in a computer language (Code).

Repeat (Loop): Instructions that can be repeated.

**Selection:** A way in computer programs to make choices (e.g. IF.THEN)

**Sequence:** A set of instructions that are followed in order.

**Sprite:** (in Scratch) an object that can be controlled by programming.

**Testing:** Checking if a program works how it should.




#### What is binary?

This is what binary code looks like. What do you notice?




Binary is extremely important to the computer world. We use the alphabet to write letters or words to communicate.

Computers use binary code. Computers today use digits to represent information - that's why they're called digital systems. The simplest and most common way to represent digits is the binary number system, with just two digits (usually written as 0 and 1). A binary digit, or bit, is the smallest unit of data in computing. It is called binary because there are only two different digits used, or two states. The majority of computers today store all sorts of information in binary form. Here is a short video to explain how binary works.







# The Stages of a Project:

This explains how a computing project is developed in stages to meet specific needs or expectations.

**Ask** - Who will it be for? What has to be done? What are the problems?

**Imagine** - Brainstorm ideas and choose the best one.

Plan - Draw a diagram, gather resources. How should it be done? What could it look like?

**Create** - Follow the plan. Create the project as efficiently as possible.

Improve - What could work better? Does it do what it should? Does it need modifying?

**Repeat** these steps 1-5 times. Review the project's success. How could it be improved further?

#### What about the future of technology?

Technology is constantly changing the way we live our lives. Just think about our homes. Homes are becoming smarter with appliances running automatically and able to be controlled from apps over wifi.

What makes something a smart home device? Generally, it's defined by its ability to connect to a Wi-Fi network, allowing you to remotely interact with it using a smartphone app, or through voice commands towards your preferred virtual assistant like Alexa or Siri. You may already have smart devices at home, speakers, TVs, vacuum cleaners, light bulbs, door bell or heating system.

You may of heard people talking about the 'digital divide'. The digital divide is when some people can't benefit from using technology because they:

- can't afford a device such as a computer or smart phone.
- live in an area with a slow internet connection.
- live in a country where some websites are blocked.

#### What is coding language?

A coding or programming language is a computer language programmers use to develop software programs, scripts or other sets of instructions for computers to follow.

There are lots of different coding languages to choose from but some popular choices for children are:

#### Scratch

With Scratch, you can program your own interactive stories, games and animations. Aged 6-15. You can look at projects others have made and if you are stuck you can look at the games scripts.

#### **Python**



Python is surprisingly easy to learn, so it's a good choice to learn for your first text based programming language. Code Monkey is a good place to start learning some basic python.

#### **JavaScript**

Blockly Games

JavaScript is the programming language of the Internet, it helps make the Web awesome, it can be used to create animations and games. Try this simple introduction to JavaScript. You could also try Blockly, this is Google's visual programming language based on JavaScript.

AR stands for augmented reality and it is when the real world as seen through the lens of a mobile device is enhanced or changed through the use of virtual elements such as objects, text, video or audio. Quite simply AR overlays (puts) digital content on top of the real world as seen through a camera lens.




# Basic Windows & PC Skills




How do you find the size of a file or folder on your computer? To find the size of a computer file or folder is very easy. Open File Explorer (aka Windows Explorer).


Hover the mouse curser over the file or look at the column marked size.



Knowing the size of a file is very important, particularly if you plan on sharing the file with other people. If you plan to email the file, email apps will only allow files that are approximately 10mb maximum.

How do you export a document in a different file format? There are lots of reasons you might need to export the document you are working on into other file formats. If you want to send someone a letter you have written in Word, it's always a good idea to convert it in to a PDF first. This is because word documents can be altered whereas PDF ones can't.





In Word press Home > Export PDF > Then choose where to save it.

- 1. Open a file in Google Docs, Sheets, or Slides.
- 2. In the top right corner, click Share.
- 3. Under "People" in the box, type the email address of the person you want to share with.
- 4. Click Done. The people you shared with will get an email letting them know you've shared a file.

#### **Important Words:**

**Application/App:** An application, also referred to as a mobile app or simply an app, is a computer program.

**Attachment:** An email attachment is a computer file sent along with an email message.

Audio: Music or sound recording or file.

**Blog/Blogging:** A blog (a shortened version of "weblog") is an online journal or informational website.

**Data:** Numbers that represent images, video, text and sound. **Digital Content:** Any content that exists in the form of digital data. Also known as digital media.

eBook: A digital book that can be read on a computer.

Emoji: Images that show a mood, feeling or actions.

Font: A font is the specific style of text that's printed on a page or displayed on a computer screen.

Format: Changing or editing the look of your digital work.

Frame: Single image in a film or animation.

**GigaByte:** A unit of computer information consisting of 1,000,000,000 bytes.

**Hyperlink:** A way of connecting different Web pages together on the Internet. A hyperlink is a word or graphic display on one Web page.

Icon: Small image that can be used instead of words.

Illustration: Drawings showing ideas or characters.

**Illustrator:** A person who draws or creates pictures for magazines, books, advertising, etc.

**Information:** Data such as numbers, text, images presented in a meaningful way.

**MegaByte:** A unit of computer information consisting of 1,000,000 bytes.

**Menu:** A set of options when using a computer or app to help find information or do a task.

**Multimedia:** Different types of media. For example images, text, video and sound.

Palette: The range of colours available to the user of a computer.

Save: Keep and store your work on a computer.

Screenshot: An image of what is shown on a computer screen

**Screencast:** To broadcast a device's screen on another device e.g. TV.

**Shortcut:** A combination of keys that is a quicker way of doing something in order to save time or effort.

**Soundtrack:** the sounds, especially the music, of a film/movie, or a separate recording of this.

**Storyboard:** a series of drawings or images showing the planned order of images.

**Tool:** An item in an app that helps you do something on a computer. For example the pen tool can be used to draw.

Word Processor: An application for writing text on a computer.

#### **Creating Presentations:**

A presentation is made up of several slides about a topic, usually played in a linear order on a screen (one after another). Here are some things to think about when creating a presentation:

- Colour scheme, does it match the topic?
- A consistent design used across all the slides, same font and size etc.
- Transitions added between the slides.
- Objects are animated in and out for effect.
- Bullet points are used to summarise key facts.
- Always think who is your audience? Make it appropriate!

#### What is a non-linear presentation?


Non-linear presentations allow you to navigate through slides without having to follow a strict order. They give the presenter the ability to jump over slides, depending on what information is most relevant. They are a bit like a website, in that one slide can easily lead to another.

There will be some navigation method built into the presentation such as 'Go To', Previous, Next buttons and perhaps hyperlinks are included that jump to other parts of the presentation.




#### How to create nonlinear presentations:

In PowerPoint, Keynote or Google slides you can link slides to one another by creating a hyperlink.

You can also return to your main table of contents by using action buttons with links.

For example if you wanted to return 'home' you can insert a shape, and create a hyperlink to the specific slide you desire.







#### What is a Podcast?

A podcast is downloadable broadcast or audio show, which can include video, music or speech. It's basically a short audio recording, a bit like a radio show. However, instead of being broadcast live, a podcast is recorded and shared over the Internet, so that you can listen to it whenever you please, thus giving them a much wider audience reach. Podcasts are often published as part of a series of similar episodes often at regular intervals. There are thousands of podcasts available, ranging from general interest entertainment shows to those which focus on specific topics (e.g. computers / music / education).

#### How do you create a Podcast?

You will need some basic equipment:

- A computer with an internal or external microphone or an iPad.
- The Anchor website or app to record your podcast.

What makes a good podcast? Here are some tips:

- Keep it short, if it is too long it may lose listeners' attention.
- Make it interesting. Choose your topic carefully.
- Always speak clearly and confidently.
- Include an appropriate introduction.
- Vary your tone of voice as this will create a better listening experience.

What can I put in a podcast?

- School news or national news for kids
- Interviews with members of staff
- Our own stories
- Film or game reviews and whatever else you feel may be appropriate!

#### Where can you get podcasts?

You can also "subscribe" to podcasts using software like Apple's Podcast, BBC Sounds, Overcast and Stitcher apps. These apps will automatically download the latest shows, and you can then listen to them on your computer, phone, tablet and / or mp3 player.






#### What is a database?

A database is simply a system that makes it easy to search, select and store information on computers. Databases are used in many different places to store information. Your school might use a database to store information about attendance or to store pupil's and teachers' contact information. Your local library might also use a database to keep track of which books are available and which are on loan.

A hospital might use a database to keep records of its patients. A patient's record may contain the following fields:



- Fields are the individual bits of information in your database. For example this field is storing the colour of one of the toys.
- Each row in your database is a **record**. This record is for a monster toy called Tom. Tom is currently on the toy shelf and is green.
- Each column in your database will have a title. All of the fields underneath this title are storing information about location.
- You can **search** your database for keywords. If you search for 'toy shelf' all of the records which have a field containing the phrase 'toy shelf' will be shown. This set of results is called a record set.

One of your friends has posted a video of you on the internet and you don't like it. You've asked them to take it down but they've said no because it's funny. What should you do?

Keep asking your friend until they take it down.

Speak to an adult and say why you don't like it.

Leave it – you can't do anything else about it.

Post a video of them to get them back.



Let's look at popular apps, platforms and online activities. **YouTube** remains a firm favourite among children. 5- to 15-year-olds are more likely to pick YouTube as their platform of choice over on-demand services such as Netflix or TV channels including the BBC and ITV. Do you prefer YouTube to normal TV?

Children's social media use is changing. WhatsApp in particular has gained popularity over the past year, joining **Facebook**, **Snapchat** and **Instagram** as one of the top social media platforms used by children. Do you or your friends use social media? If so what apps?

Newer platforms such as **TikTok** and **Twitch** are gaining popularity. TikTok is used by 13% of 12- to 15-year olds - up from 8% in 2018 - while Twitch is used by 5%.

Girl gamers are on the increase. Almost half of girls aged 5-15 now play games online - up from 39% in 2018.

#### What is E-Commerce?

Companies conducting business online, selling and buying. Always get the bill payer's permission before checking out.

Only shop on trusted sites so you aren't a victim of fraud. Be aware that cookies track which pages you visit so shops may send you targeted adverts or change their prices. Two of the biggest in the UK are Amazon and eBay.





#### What is blogging?

A blog is a website of your own where you enter information ordered by date. It can also be called an online diary or online journal that is shared with others online. Why might blog posts be censored? Sometimes people can publish things online that are illegal or offensive. In these instances, the published document can be removed, banned or content can be restricted. It is important to consider what you publish very carefully.

#### What is vlogging?

A Vlog is simply a blog that includes video content. The first vlog can be traced back to 2000. Vlogging really took off after YouTube was launched in 2005 and the rise of the Smartphone which provides easy access to those who want to vlog.

The smartphone also allowed vloggers to film their daily experiences. Today 44% of all internet users watch a vlog at least once a month.

If you fancy creating your own vlog. Get your parents permission first. Never give out personal information. Make your own original content so you aren't breaking copyright laws. Be kind! Block and report any online bullies or even turn off comments. Be aware that viral videos might be fake.



























#### What are group emails?

Email is a great way to send a message. This can be very useful if you want to share a message or document with a group of people all at once.

When you send an email, the recipient can either reply to just the sender or reply to all other recipients too. If you 'reply to all', all the other people included in the email will also be able to read your reply.

When sending emails you can also 'cc' in recipients and 'bcc' recipients.

CC stands for 'carbon copy'. It is useful when you want someone else to receive a copy of an email, but they aren't one of the primary recipients. You want the recipients of the message to know the other people who have been sent the message.

BCC stands for 'blind carbon copy'. BCC is a useful way to let others see an email you have sent without the main recipient knowing.

#### Tips for Effective Web Searching

Use keywords. E.g. Capital city France. Use inverted commas to find exact names. E.g. "Queen Elizabeth" "Chinese New Year".

Cross reference (compare) websites to check the information on them is real and reliable.

Put information into your own words to avoid plagiarism (copying someone else's work and pretending it's yours).
