

EDUCATION PENALTY NOTICES

A Guide for Parents/Carers September 2023

WHAT IS AN EDUCATION PENALTY NOTICE?

As a parent/carer it is an offence if your child fails to attend school regularly. Absences are classed as unauthorised if without a valid reason or school cannot or has not given permission.

In some circumstances parents/carers may be prosecuted under section 444 of the Education Act 1996.

An Education Penalty Notice is an alternative to prosecution and aims to improve attendance. If paid within the timescale, this prevents the matter escalating to the Magistrates Court for the period concerned.

WHY AM I BEING SENT THIS LEAFLET?

This leaflet has been sent to all parents/carers and confirms the commitment of all schools to improve attendance. It aims to raise awareness of the need for your child(ren) to attend regularly and on time in order to achieve their best. It is important parents/carers understand their responsibilities and the consequences of unauthorised absence. Parents/carers of children who have had some unauthorised absence during this academic year at school are at risk of receiving an Education Penalty Notice.

WHEN ARE EDUCATION PENALTY NOTICES USED?

You may be issued with an Education Penalty Notice for any of the following reasons:

- 10 sessions (5 days) in any 10 week period of consecutive unauthorised absence including an unauthorised leave of absence (e.g. holiday).
- 10 sessions (5 days) in any 10 week period of non-consecutive unauthorised absences.
- Unauthorised absence due to truancy including pupils stopped on truancy operations.
- Persistent late arrival at school (after the register has closed).
- Being found in a public place during the first 5 days of exclusion.

Y6 - Life on the Home Front in WWII



Evacuation of 1940 During WWII, over 3.5 million children, along with some of their teachers, mother with very young children, pregnant women and people with disabilities were evacuated from the cities to the countryside, where it was believed they would be safer from the bombing. All evacuees had to take with them their gas masks, ration book and identity card. When they reached their destination, a billeting officer would arrange a host family for them. Evacuation happened in waves, beginning on 1st September 1939. Other waves occurred at the start of the Battle of Britain and at the start of the Blitt.

This would be a war in the air and there would be vastly more civilian damage than in the First World War so evacuations was necessary.



Vocabulary

Alliance -- An agreement establishing an association between groups

Anti-Semitism—Hostility toward Jews or discrimination against them as a group

Appeasement - This was the policy of many countries when Hitler first started to take over Austria and parts of Czechoslovakia. They gave in to Hitler's demands in order to avoid going to war When Hitler invaded Poland, they realized that appeasement would not work and France and Great Britain declared war on Germany.

Atomic bomb—A very high energy bomb made of radioactive material.

Blitz—A severe or sudden attack; the German air raids on Britain in 1940 - 1

Censorship—Banning or deleting any information of value to the enemy

Evacuation—THe process of sending young people to live with host families during war time

Fascism - A type of government ruled by a dictator. Germany with Hitler and Italy with Mussolini were fascist governments.

Propaganda—Spreading a particular message in order to influence public opinion

Rationing— Allowing each person to have a limited amount of certain foods or commodities that are in short supply

Reparations—Compensation exacted from a defeated nation by the victors

Totalitarianism - The principle of unrestricted power in government





Homework

All homework will be set using Seesaw. If children have no access to internet at home parents will need to inform school so alternative arrangements can be made. Passwords will be sent home again, if they are needed.

Children will receive their homework on a Monday, which is to be completed for Friday.

There will be a big emphasis on the children knowing their multiplication tables and corresponding division facts. So please encourage your child to go on TT Rocks and any times tables apps.

Spellings


- Children will be given 15 spellings to learn fortnightly as part of their homework. The words set will be taught in class and unpicked to identify sounds and their matching grapheme representations. This is so our children can recognise how sounds are written and then they can apply this knowledge to the spelling of other words.
- At the end of the two-week cycle, the children will be given words to spell in class that are not the same as have been practised at home, but words that contain the same sounds and graphemes. Please encourage your child to practise these spellings at home in frequent, short bursts across the fortnight to help those spellings stick.

Reading



- We recognise the importance of children developing their reading fluency and text comprehension at their individual pace, but we don't want children to feel limited with their reading choices. Reading for Pleasure is the key to unlocking children's love of reading!
- Because of this, children are provided with two reading books- one based on their Accelerated Reader level, which will support them to develop their fluency, and a 'Reading for Pleasure' book, which is any book that they have chosen to read because it appeals to them.
- Reading for Pleasure books can be read independently, or shared with a family member if the text is more challenging than their AR book.
- Children will take home both books every night, and they must be returned with their Reading
 Diary every day as they will be used during independent reading times and for reading support
 in class if required.
- Children should be reading each night for 20 minutes. Children can read from either book when they are taken home (although we do recommend ensuring both are accessed, as AR books are needed to support fluency development).
- After reading any book, children should complete an Accelerated Reader quiz on the book. The URL has recently changed- a new link to access it will be added to Seesaw. (Usernames and passwords are the same- ensure passwords are entered in lower case.)

Reading diaries



- Reading diaries are also taken home every night to be returned each day.
- We ask that they are completed each day. We will monitor diaries weekly to determine how much reading has been completed across the previous week by your child.
- We have made our diaries very simple so they are quick to keep up to date.
- Please record the page number that your child read to on a given night. They should also record when a book has been finished so we can see when they changed their book.
- A comment section for each week is available underneath if you would like to comment on your child's reading or if they would like to write something themselves. Comment ideas are in the diary!
- Children should also record in the diary a list of the books they are currently reading.
- If reading diaries have not been seen in school for one week, a Parent App message or phone call will be made by the teacher to ask about your child's reading habits.

Boosters

- Year 6 will start their booster sessions from 18th September.
- The children will be invited to attend sessions focusing on Reading, Maths and SPaG every Monday after school.
- The sessions will run from 3.20pm-4pm with Mrs Rooney,
 Mrs Quigley, Mrs Guest, Miss Sharratt and Mrs Wright.
- In addition to the booster sessions, CPG booster/revision books will be available to purchase from school. More information about prices will be sent out in a separate letter.

What are the SATS tests?

- The end of KS2 assessments are sometimes informally referred to as 'SATS'.
- SATS week across the country begins on 13th May 2023.
- Pupils will complete test papers in some of the areas that have to be assessed. Other areas, like writing, are assessed using evidence collected by the teacher over a longer period of time.
- Pupils will complete SATS test papers in:
 - Reading
 - Grammar, Punctuation & Vocabulary
 - Spelling
 - Arithmetic
 - Mathematical Reasoning 2 papers

- The completed papers are sent away to be marked externally.
- Results are returned to school in July.
- The tests vary in length but last no longer than 60 minutes:
 - Reading: 60 minutes
 - Grammar, Punctuation & Vocabulary: 45 minutes
 - Spelling: 15 minutes
 - Arithmetic: 30 minutes
 - Mathematical Reasoning: 2 papers of 40 minutes each.

 This is a worthwhile trip where the children will take part in challenging, rewarding and team-building activities.
- The cost of the Robinwood residential is £265 including transport.





11) Suggested Clothing List

There is no need to go out and buy anything special for a trip to Robinwood, all specialist equipment is provided for our on-centre activities.

The clothing list given includes clothing being worn on the journey, so for example assuming you are wearing socks and underwear on your journey to Robinwood, you only need to pack 5 pairs of each!

- 3 T-shirts (not vest type)
- 3 Sweatshirts/Jumpers/Hoodies/Fleeces(long sleeved) tops
- 3 Pairs of trousers
- 2 Pairs of shorts (Knee Length)
- 6 Sets of underwear
- 6 Pairs of socks
- 1 Pair of trainers
- 1 Pair of outdoor shoes/boots
- 2 Towels
- 1 Coat (ideally waterproof, required for walk to and from centre)
- 1 Warm hat/sun hat
- 1 Pair of gloves
- 1 Set of nightwear
- 1 Bag of toiletries (including suntan lotion/insect repellent in warm weather)
- 1 Black bin liner

PLEASE ENSURE THAT YOUR CHILD IS DRESSED APPROPRIATELY WITH SUITABLE FOOTWEAR FOR AN INITIAL WALK TO THE CENTRE/INITIAL ACTIVITY (APPROX 1-2 MILES DEPENDING UPON CENTRE)

Robinwood -Key information

Please don't bring to Robinwood:

- Mobile phones
- Valuable items including expensive watches, tablets
- Cameras or any item with the capacity to take photos (staff will take plenty of photos)
- Aerosols
- Food, including sweets (allergen risks)

Your child can bring:

Items that aid sleeping routine, e.g. teddy, book, small nightlight

Robinwood - Key information

- Staff can usually access Wi-Fi at Robinwood, so staff will tweet pictures of some activities at the end of each day.
- All medicines for your child should be in school, if they are not, please can you send them in asap.
- On medical forms, please include permission for paracetamol and ibuprofen to be administered if you are happy with us doing so, as we will be unable to give any Calpol or equivalent medicine for pain relief or headaches without your consent.
- Mrs Glanvill is your point of contact if you need to get in touch with your child in an emergency; I will provide her phone number for you in a letter in October.

Feel Good Friday

 These will continue to be held on the last Friday of each month and the children can wear their own clothes to school that day.

School Snack Guidelines

- Most children require a snack at morning break to keep them going through the day.
- We encourage children to bring in healthy snacks.
- KS1 have a daily snack of fruit or veg provided free by the government, so additional snacks for these ages may not be required but you may send them in if you prefer.
- Children in EYFS have a healthy snack as part of their continuous provision so do not need any additional snacks to be sent in.



If you are intending to send in healthy snacks here are some suggestic **NUT FREE** below:

- Vegetable sticks such as celery, cucumber, peppers or carrot.
- A piece of cheddar cheese or babybel
- A piece of fresh or dried fruit. Grapes must be sliced in half.
- Bread sticks, plain pretzels, banana bread, malt loaf, oat/rice cakes an small pitta breads are also good snacks, providing children with carbohydrate to sustain them in-between meals.
- Homemade snacks such as flapjacks or other oat/whole grain based snack.
- **Everything sent into school must be nut free.**
- Items brought into school should be carefully checked by you, to ensure this.
- We have pupils who are severely allergic to a range of nuts.
- We are aiming for a common-sense approach, with the key being to keep it healthy and no chocolate, sweets or crisps at breaktimes.
- We need the children to stay hydrated and so please ensure they bring a named
 - water bottle into school daily.
- Squash and fruit juice are not permitted.


Learning Mentor and Attendance officer
