Forest School

Forest School is a unique and inspiring approach to learning that takes place in a natural outdoor setting. It's all about giving children the time and space to explore, play, and learn at their own pace, in a way that truly connects them to the world around them.



Children will need wellies each **Monday**, they can be left in school if you wish. It's also a good idea to keep a spare pair of socks in their book bag, just in case! We'll provide waterproof overall suits to help keep them warm and dry while they play and explore outdoors.

Curriculum Map – Autumn Term

Through the Getting to know you more clearly scheme children will learn about:

Creation and Covenant

Children will learn about God's promise, or covenant, with Noah and with all creatures and a promise that is symbolised by the rainbow. How the Sacrament of Baptism is a covenant with God and, as in the story of Noah, a person is reborn from the waters. Through the Sacrament of Baptism, each person is 'reborn' into a new life in the Christian family

Prophecy and Promise

The liturgical season of Advent is explored as the preparation for the coming of Christ at Christmas. Children will learn to understand some of the symbols used during the Advent season and to explore how other cultures prepare for Christmas. Children will know that the Church is God's Family. They will learn to understand that they are part of that family too.

MATHS

We will begin the term with a focus on Place Value. Counting objects to 100 by making 10s. Partitioning numbers to 100 and estimating numbers on a number line. We will practice counting in 2s, 3s, 5s and

Addition and Subtraction

We will then develop our knowledge of fact families - using addition facts, number bonds within 10 and applying this to addition problem solving. We will introduce subtraction - take away and crossing out to find out how many left over. We will look at how we can complete subtraction using a number line.

Shape

Recognising and naming 2-D and 3-D shapes. We will look for patterns and recognise the properties of the shapes such as vertices, edges and faces

ENGLISH

Phonics will be at the heart of our learning and writing.

A River by Marc Martin,

Children will write a narrative and a letter to inform. They will learn to use capital letters, full stops, and question marks, and apostrophes for singular possession. Lessons include using correct and consistent tense. subordination (when, if, that, because), coordination (or, and, but), and expanded noun phrases. Children will also explore sentence functions, er/-est adjective suffixes, turning adjectives into adverbs with -ly, and forming plural nouns with -s or -es.

The Night Gardener by The Fan

Children will write about where the story happens, practicing clear place descriptions. They'll write a diary to retell the story. They'll use words ending in -ly (like quickly) and adjectives with -ful or -less (like cheerful or careless). They'll join ideas with and, but, so, and write questions and exclamations. They'll also start checking their writing for capitals, full stops, commas, question marks, exclamation marks, and apostrophes.

SCIENCE

Children will learn about living things and their habitats. They will explore what all living things need to stay alive and sort things into three groups: alive, once alive, or never alive. They will look at different habitats around the world and discover which animals and plants live there. Children will also learn how plants and animals depend on one another and create food chains to show how energy moves between living things.

Microhabitats

Children will find out how scientists ask questions and explore microhabitats, small places that provide for minibeasts. They will investigate school grounds, ask their own science questions, test conditions for woodlice, and identify local flowering plants



PSHE

In PSHE, we will study the topics of resisting pressure and getting help; recognising hurtful behaviour

Respecting ourselves and others Recognising things in common and differences; We will explore how we play and work cooperatively; sharing our opinions.

Belonging to a community Belonging to a group;

Children will look at roles and responsibilities; the positive impact of being the same and different in the community.

The Great Fire of London

GEOGRAPHY

Using evidence, we will find out what actually happened during the Great Fire and how can we know for sure 350 years later. We will begin to understand why the Great Fire burnt down so many buildings. Thinking about what the people did to manage the fire and what more could have been done to stop the Fire. London as we know it today is very different and we

Children will learn about the Equator. They will know that, because it is the widest part of the Earth, the Equator is much closer to the sun than the North and South poles. They will begin to understand that different parts of the world experience different weather conditions and that these are often caused by the location of the place. Children will learn to name the seven continents of the world.

DESIGN &

TECHNOLOGY This terms focus is on Textiles and sewing:

MUSIC

Children will Sing songs with increasing accuracy and control. We will prepare for our Christmas performance. Children will begin to Demonstrate an understanding of dynamics and tempo following written or visual instructions.

Fundamental Skills

Balancing, running, changing direction, jumping, hopping and skipping as basic skills will be explored.

Gymnastics

Children will develop gymnastic skills of jumping, rolling, balancing and travelling individually and in combination to create short sequences and movement phrases.

Dance

We will move to express ideas, mood, character or feeling, using counts of 8 consistently to keep in time with the music. We will explore pathways, levels, shapes, directions, speeds and timing.

Target Games

Children will learn how to score points and play to the rules. They will develop the skills of throwing, rolling, kicking and striking to targets.


Writer of the Week

This year we're excited to introduce a new Writing Scheme. We'll be focusing on helping children develop their handwriting and composition skills. Each week in assembly, we love celebrating children who have made fantastic progress in their writing.

School Snack Guidelines



- We encourage children to bring in healthy snacks for morning break. Crisps and chocolate bars should not be sent in for morning break.
- Water bottles please can they be filled only with water.
 They can be refilled throughout the day.
- KS1 have a daily snack of fruit or veg provided free by the government, so additional snacks for these year groups are not required but you may send them in if you prefer.
- Children in EYFS have a healthy snack as part of their continuous provision so do not need any additional snacks to be sent in.

Homework

Homework is here to help support your child's learning. We know that sometimes other things come up, so **our main ask is that daily reading at home remains the top priority**.

Homework set in Year 2 will consist of:

- Reading (20 minutes per night) recorded in the reading diary.
- SPaG Online Spelling, Punctuation and Grammar (1 activity per week)
- Spelling Shed Spelling practise (15 words to be practised across 2 weeks)
- NUMBOTS Games that support fluency and number recall. (practise regularly for fun)
- Maths Shed Number activity based on Maths taught in class (1 activity set per week)

Every Friday, children take a short arithmetic quiz in class. This note is sent home so you can see how your child is doing and to help support their learning. It also gives you an opportunity to practice similar questions at home with your child, helping them improve and feel more confident.

From time to time, we may invite children to take part in a fun, creative project for example, making a model or something they can bring into school to share. These activities are completely optional, and there's absolutely no pressure to take part. They're just a lovely way to extend learning in a hands-on, enjoyable way if your child is interested!

Class texts - Autumn Term

The books which we will be looking at in more detail are:



A River by Marc Martin and write a story and a letter. They will learn about capital letters, full stops, question marks, and apostrophes. Lessons include tense, joining words, describing phrases, sentence types, and how to change words.

The Night Gardener by Fan brothers. They'll write a diary to retell the story using -ly adverbs and -ful/-less adjectives. They'll join ideas with and, but, so. They'll write questions, exclamations, and check for correct punctuation and capital letters.

Ready Steady Write uses outstanding children's books to help young writers thrive. Structured step-by-step lessons follow Talk for Writing principles, building key skills through reading, discussion, and creativity. We celebrate every child's voice, offering plenty of opportunities to share ideas, develop confidence, and enjoy writing with purpose.


Reading



We recognise the importance of children developing their reading fluency and text comprehension at their individual pace, but we don't want children to feel limited with their reading choices. Reading for Pleasure is the key to unlocking children's love of reading!

- Because of this, children are provided with two reading books- one decodable book based on their phonic understanding, and a 'Reading for Pleasure' book – their sharing book- which are story books rich in vocabulary designed to be shared with others.
- Children will take home both books on a Friday, and they must be returned with their Reading Diary on Fridays. Decodable books are changed once a week and sharing books are changed at the same time.
- Children should be reading each night for 20 minutes. Children can read from either book when they are taken home (although we do recommend ensuring both are accessed, as phonetic books are needed to support fluency development).

Reading diaries



- Reading diaries are taken home along with reading books.
- We ask that they are completed each day. We will monitor diaries weekly to determine how much reading has been completed across the previous week by your child.
- We have made our diaries very simple, so they are quick to keep up to date.
- Please record the pages that your child has read each night.
- A comment section for each week is available underneath
 if you would like to comment on your child's reading.
- Please record in the diary a list of the books they are currently reading including reading for pleasure and books from home.
- If reading diaries have not been seen in school for one week, a Parent App message or phone call will be made by the teacher to ask about your child's reading habits.

How Can you best support your child

- Promote good attendance and punctuality every minute counts
- Daily reading and asking questions about the text
- Encourage the children to read unseen texts and use inference to talk about the content of the text
- Make number problems a part of everyday life
- Learn together 2, 5 and 10 multiplication tables and corresponding division facts.
- Regularly promote writing
- Encourage the accurate use of spelling
- Focus on accuracy with spelling and handwriting
- Complete homework together and talk about learning
- Learn to tell the time together
- Learn to tie shoelaces (promoting independence)

STATUTORY TESTS

SATs – Standard Assessment Tests

Key Stage 1 SATs are **no longer compulsory national tests**. However, they have been 'replaced' by *optional KS1 SATs tests*. These *optional* SATs tests will continue to be used across **all schools in England**

We will choose whether we will administer these optional KS1 SATs.

Optional SATs tests may be taken in Math's, Reading and Grammar, Punctuation and Spelling, under informal exam conditions. These papers will be marked by the teachers along with teacher assessments in Writing and Science.

Optional SATs will help us to confirm our ongoing judgements on your child's attainment. It gives us a clear benchmark that informs our teacher assessments and enables us to continue to support your child as they move into Key Stage Two.

Children will do optional tests in class. They will think they are doing quizzes. There is nothing to worry about and there is no pressure put on the children. It is a way to showcase their attainment and progress.

STATUTORY TESTS

Phonics

We use phonics to help children learn to read. It's a proven and effective method that builds strong reading and writing skills. This year, children will go over Phase 5 phonics and review earlier phases too. This helps make sure they are confident using sounds (GPCs) in their reading, spelling, and writing.

Most children completed the Phonics Screening Check in Year 1. However, some children may resit the check in **June** to help us see how they're progressing. The check has 40 words – 20 real words and 20 "alien" (made-up) words. These fun, nonsense words help us see how well children can use their phonics skills to read unfamiliar words.

We would like to thank you for your support as we help your child become a confident reader and writer!
